

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Destin High School

THE DESTIN HIGH SCHOOL **PROJECT**

Following approval by the Destin City Council in June 2016, the Destin High School Advisory Committee formed to turn a vision into a reality. Comprised of nine volunteers in Destin from a variety of backgrounds, the committee developed a project plan with supporting data and research proving that not only was a high school in Destin viable, it was necessary.

The committee's findings were presented to the Destin City Council in May 2017 as the council discussed potential Triumph projects. Upon review of the data and a vote, the Destin High School Project was selected as one of the four projects the council wished to present to the county and beyond for Triumph funds.

Our next step is presenting to the Okaloosa County School District and discovering how we can work together to address this need that clearly would have a positive effect on the entire county. The committee will next meet the first week of August to finalize preparations for presentation to Superintendent Mary Beth Jackson and the school board.

Here are a few key facts to consider:

- Destin high school students must travel across two bridges to attend school, bridges which close in inclement weather preventing the students from either getting home or back to school; the Mid-Bay Bridge also requires a \$4 toll- \$8 a day just to get to and from school.
- Sharp, steady increases in enrollment at Destin schools from 1st to 8th grade
- A 34% increase in 3rd grade alone between 2012-13 and 2016-17
- Destin Elementary School (DES) has the highest population of any elementary school in the county and school-wide assemblies are nearly impossible because no one location can house all students at the same time. Students attend class in portables, some of which have been in place longer than 20 years
- DES and Destin Middle School (DMS) both exceed state-determined capacity and cannot accept waivers. In fact, eleven schools in Okaloosa County are above capacity; both high schools that Destin feeds into are overcrowded and deteriorating
- At Niceville High School (which is also over capacity), in order to ensure all students have a lunch period, administrators are forced to cut into instructional time to create additional lunch shifts. At DMS, 8th graders to not have lunch until almost 1:30pm in order to accommodate the number of students.
- There are regular floods inside Niceville High due to deterioration of the HVAC and plumbing systems. The time is now to address these needs. Building a Destin High school doesn't just help Destin students, it helps the entire county's students obtain an education in an environment that is not only safe, but conducive to learning.

Feedback from the June 5th Workshop

The City has held several workshops during the past few months to hear the public's concerns and the issues they feel need attention. The workshops covered many topics but the focus was on comprehensive plan/land development code (LDC) changes and beach issues. Here are few of the items discussed:

- Comp Plan/LDC: short-term rental and commercial use of a residence; height restrictions- removing tier references and limiting heights to levels more similar to former Tier One; lack of council overview; occupancy standards; wedding houses; infrastructure; possible architectural standards; working with county to ensure consistent ordinances in unannexed areas (i.e. signage, heights)
- Code Enforcement: dire need of actual enforcement (legal teeth) and more personnel; parking and noise issues; harbor issues
- Beach Issues: 20' rule validity; options of claiming all beach as public from toe of dune; public trust doctrine; ordinances on umbrellas/sizes; need for cooperation; beach cleaning; need for TDC funds to support needs such as public safety

This is only a brief summary of items discussed and is not comprehensive. These issues are being addressed by city staff and the council and will be appearing on future agendas for discussion and possible action.

- The Destin Airport Compatibility Committee has been dissolved. Actually the BCC voted to dissolve the committee and sought Destin's sign-off. We have reinitiated these discussions because we feel it is critical for us to have a say. What occurs at the airport affects our residents and we should remain involved.
- Port of Destin? Official Waterway? These are some options that the city is looking into so that we may better manage activity and issues in the water. Such a designation would allow us to oversee, enact, and enforce.
- Isn't that what the recently passed bill does? No. HB 7043 gives the county jurisdiction over commercial vessels operating in its waterways, among other things.
- The city is allowing commercial activity on private property. The city does not allow such activities unless there is a noted exception. In fact, council on 7/17 approved, on 1st reading, an ordinance specifically related to commercial activity in city parks.
